2024 HURRICANE SEASON

The Atlantic hurricane season started on June 1. Being prepared and knowing what to do are key. There is no need to panic if you are prepared and have a plan. Pages 10-11 contain helpful articles about storm prep, flood insurance, weather resources, and more.

It has been over a decade since the Galveston-Houston region has experienced a true major hurricane. The damage from a direct hit of a major hurricane is more than flooding. Major hurricanes in Houston are typically major wind events that can cause long power outages. Very similar to the Derecho storm event in May but across the entire City. During Hurricane Ike, most of Westbury was out of power for at least 2 weeks.

We live in a very large city near the coast, so advice is different for each area of town. It is important to know where you live. Westbury is NOT in an evacuation zone. A long-time hurricane saying is, "Run from the surge, hide from the wind". This means that the average Westbury homeowner should remain at home, inside, sheltered in place, during the event. See page 11 for tips on what to do if a hurricane is coming.

When there is an active storm in the Gulf of Mexico, you should always pay close attention to trusted weather sources on what is happening with the storm. **Page 10 has a list of weather sources.**

Hurricanes can bring localized flash flooding with heavy rain bands. Page 10 gives the links to the flood gages and how to look up that information and how the Westbury gage and weirs work. Make a plan, be prepared, and stay safe.

The adult water fitness classes are full, and people are enjoying them. Summer also means the beginning of hurricane season. You will find good helpful information to help you better understand, prepare, and be ready for whatever comes our way, see pages 10-11. It seems that every year the prediction is for an active hurricane season and often that turns out not to be the case. May 2024 Board Notes

- ◆Concerns with HISD issues. WCC Board passed Resolution: "Due to the removal of the Principals of both Westbury High School and Meyerland Middle School who were both effective and inspired neighborhood confidence, the board of the Westbury Civic Club crafts this resolution of no-confidence in Mr. Miles and the HISD Board of Managers. Both Anderson ES and Meyerland MS are in need of major campus rebuilds. However, we fear that the very necessary HISD Bond referendum that we are in favor of, will be unsuccessful due to the current level of distrust in the TEA appointed management."
- ◆Public Safety Property crimes higher than typical in May.
- ◆Updates Mini-Murals in progress by Westbury Super Neighborhood/WAIC. City Pool is opening for first time in several years. New Dr. Shannon Walker city library in Westbury is opening in June
- ◆WCC Office doing deed restriction drive-arounds and sending letters through the new portal. Late statements sent to Parkwest 1 and 2. Voluntary letters starting to be sent out section by section.
- ◆The June WCC meeting was canceled due Juneteenth federal holiday.



Regular Household Trash

Pick-up is EVERY Thursday. Regular household trash goes into the black trash can.

Yard Waste

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct bio-degradable bags.



Recycling in Westbury

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

Westbury is a unique neighborhood with the majority of the 5,000 homes having voluntary dues. Only about 450 homes in Parkwest 1 and Parkwest 2 have Mandatory Assessments. The active participation of volunteers and yearly dues contributions help the Westbury Civic Club achieve our goal and remain active in the City of Houston. The total voluntary dues requested for 2024 is \$385. This includes the WCC Dues and Westbury Area Patrol.

PLEASE NOTE: All homes are subject to the deed restrictions whether the dues are paid or not. All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have ACTIVE deed restrictions.

Westbury Civic Club Dues - \$60

The WCC has been vital in keeping Westbury a desirable neighborhood over the past 60 years. The WCC helps maintain 7 miles of esplanades, issues the Westbury Crier monthly newsletter, enforces deed restrictions, provides community events and acts as a very important liaison with the City of Houston while advocating for Westbury. In a City the size of Houston, it is important to make sure you have someone representing you and your neighborhood. The WCC has done a good job of maintaining Westbury for over 60 years. Your contribution helps covers everything needed to operate and maintain the services we provide, this includes office rent, utilities, insurance, postage, printing, legal and professional fees, salary, etc. The WCC has one employee and all other work is done by Westbury board member volunteers, this allows us to keep our costs lower.

Westbury Area Constable Patrol - \$325

The WCC has a contract with Harris County, Precinct 5, Contract Deputy Program to patrol Westbury and provide 24-hour response. This program is referred to as the Westbury Area Patrol (WAP). The WAP currently consists of three Constables (2 Deputies and 1 Sergeant) that are assigned patrol Westbury daily. The Contract Deputy Program is designed so that even when a Westbury deputy is unavailable, the next closest Pct. 5 Constable will be dispatched. Several of our bordering neighborhoods (Meyerland, Maplewood, and Marilyn Estates) also participate in the Pct. 5 Contract Deputy Program, so deputies are typically nearby at all times.

The Harris County Pct. 5 Constables are certified peace officers, licensed by the State of Texas to enforce the laws of the State of Texas. The deputies are uniformed, armed and drive distinctively marked, emergency equipped, law enforcement vehicles. The Constables provide high visibility, rapid response to emergency and non-emergency calls, vacation watches, alarm monitoring, and home security checks. The WCC gets regular crime reports from our Sergeant to ensure that the WCC is kept up to date with crimes in our area.

2024 MANDATORY ASSESSMENTS

2024 Mandatory Assessments - \$290

Owners in Parkwest 1 and Parkwest 2 revised their deed restrictions in 1993 & 1994 to include Mandatory Assessments.

- → Properties in Parkwest 1 that have a new owner of record after the January 1, 1993, are subject to the Mandatory Assessment clause.
- → Properties in Parkwest 2 that have a new owner of record after the January 1, 1994, are subject to the Mandatory Assessment clause.

The Mandatory Assessments are due annually on February 1. The 2024 Mandatory Assessments are \$290. The WCC has launched our NEW online owner portal. This now makes it easy to view, track, and make payments online. The 2024 invoices for Mandatory homes will be mailed in January to the address on record. If you do not receive your invoice, please sign up for your new online owner portal (use the handy QR code to the left) to view a copy or email westburycc@sbcglobal.net. If you have past due assessments and would like to set up a payment plan, please email the WCC office at westburycc@sbcglobal.net.

- 100% biodegradable bag (with specs of ASTM D6400)
- 100% compostable bag (with specs of ASTM D6400)
- Personal reusable container (50 lb. weight limit with lid)

Yard waste collection is on Thursday each week with the regular trash. If yours does not get collected, please call 311 to report. Service personnel will not collect curbside yard waste mixed with trash, paper, plastic or any other waste.



Local Community Upset with Changes in HISD An Editorial by Becky Edmondson, President of the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation

After learning of both Westbury HS and Meyerland MS losing their principals along with others, I felt we needed to get some answers. Below is the majority of the letter I sent to the TEA and all of our elected officials from the Governor on down the line.

Dear TEA,

Is it not the quintessence of asininity to force the resignation of the best in HISD in order to improve the educational process? How does that make sense? I've remained quiet; thinking that there must be a reasonable explanation...not the wildly ridiculous social media explanations...but this week has left me baffled.

"How is HISD going to recover?" How is Houston going to survive a plummet in housing prices if no one will attend the public schools and chooses to move to the outlying "lands" where they have functioning school systems? With so many teachers voluntarily leaving HISD, and now dozens of others fired or forced to resign, where are the good teachers coming from? And now two of the principals of the year from 2023 have been "fired"?

I love my city, I love my neighborhood, I love my neighborhood schools and the kids that attend them.

The Westbury community is passionate about our zoned schools:

Parker ES, Anderson ES, Meyerland MS, and Westbury HS and peripherally all of these, too, as parts of Westbury are zoned to all of these schools: Foerster ES, Fondren MS, Pin Oak MS, Kolter ES, and Elrod ES. We were represented by two trustees that we voted for and that we knew, Myrna Guidry and Sue Deigaard. Now we have no one.

Westbury, like neighborhoods across the city, are invested in our neighborhood schools and our children's schools of choice. The Westbury Area Improvement Corp, a part of the Westbury Super Neighborhood, funds special events at Anderson ES and Westbury HS and offers support year-round. The Westbury Community Garden has worked closely with Foerster ES in the past. The Friends of Westbury High School has awarded over \$600,000 in scholarships, with \$36,000 just awarded last month.

We, as community members and taxpayers, need to have answers from the State of Texas as to what the goal truly is. I naively thought it was to fix what was broken in HISD and improve the education for our children. And yes, it was broken, my former trustee sentenced to prison, the Parker ES bond guy indicted on dozens of charges, the school board president indicted and pleading guilty. So much dishonesty that we on the PAT for WHS had to literally FIGHT to get what was promised in the 2012 bond and they still reneged on part of it. Thank you to our then Trustee Wanda Adams for fighting for us and getting some of it back!

We need answers from the State and the TEA. Is this truly a plot to destroy Houston? Is this a ploy to send parents to private schools so they will vote to support the voucher program? What are you people thinking? WHS and MSPVA, who both lost their long-time principals, were fine arts magnets...is this a way to destroy the magnet programs by removing the admins who supported them?

Our children lost more than a year during Covid, and now these same kids suffered through a stressful year with distracted, angry, and depressed teachers who had (and still some don't know) if they have jobs and what their salaries might be. This is no way to treat our children and it is not the way to treat our teachers and admins. Mr. Miles and his team turned Teacher Appreciation Week into HELL week.

I am so sad for WHS and MSPVA and all the other schools impacted by this travesty, for the parents, for the students, for the teachers, for the admins, for all those who have been investing in their neighborhood schools or their children's school of choice. It seems that all those hundreds and thousands of hours invested have been for naught.

I am praying for a brighter future and hope that someone can step in and answer the questions that so many of us have.

Protest at Meyerland Middle School

Hundreds of angry parents and supporters of HISD schools protested along city streets surrounding Meyerland Middle School on May 13, dismayed that popular and experienced school principal Auden Sarabia was being forced to resign by appointed HISD Superintendent Mike Miles. Parents contend that flawed data is being used to remove high-achieving principals at excellent schools.

Mr. Sarabia won the HISD Principal of the Year Award the previous year for the middle school / high school category. Additionally, the elementary school HISD Principal of the Year from last year was also forced to resign by HISD, so there were also protests at her school and at other schools where experienced principals and teachers were being forced to resign.

The Houston Press noted that, "Parental frustration over broken promises made by Superintendent Miles about his plans for HISD following the TEA takeover has been brewing the last few months. Each month hundreds of parents and students have signed up to speak at board meetings about how his non-proven NES policies are destroying what is working within the district and demoralizing our educators," said 2022-23 Meyerland PTO president Amanda Sorena, in a press release.





City Water Bill Improvement Plan

Mayor Whitmire recently announced several reforms to prevent erroneous water bills, clean up structural issues within current billing/customer service operations, and ensure that water bills are correct.

Changes include the replacement of all non-functioning remote read devices and installing these devices on the meters that do not have them. This will ensure accurate readings so that bills will no longer be estimated. It is a huge step towards restoring trust and transparency in the system.

This comprehensive approach incorporates components of council member discussions as well as budget amendments that have been presented. We are all looking forward to a fair and more accurate process with these immediate changes.

What's Changing?

Starting April 1, 2024, single-family residential customers will notice a significant shift in their water bills. A set usage will now be calculated for their water consumption, reflected in their May bill. This change aims to offer consistency to customers while HPW works on enhancing the accuracy of future monthly water usage readings.

Why Was This Change Necessary?

The previous billing system left much to be desired, riddled with inconsistencies and inaccuracies that left customers frustrated and confused. Numerous calls flooded our office from residents grappling with unusually high bills or those not aligning with their actual water usage. This new system directly addresses these issues.

What the City Aims For

With the introduction of set usage calculation, customers can anticipate more predictable water bills each month, avoiding any financial surprises. By prioritizing accurate readings and implementing necessary improvements, HPW is dedicated to fostering trust with its customers and streamlining the billing process for everyone involved.

Thanks to a City of Houston SuperNeighborhood Grant that the Westbury Area Improvement Corp applied for and was awarded, Westbury has a beautiful new mini mural. We worked with UPART Studios, the group that brought the first mini mural to Houston right here in Westbury.

Our new mini mural is located at Chimney Rock and Burdine on the approach to the new Dr Shannon Walker Library at 11630 Chimney Rock. The design is in honor of Dr. Shannon Walker, a native Houstonian as well as a Westburian, who is the first Houstonian to command the International Space Station. She is our very own home grown astronaut attending Parker ES, Johnson Junior High (now MPVA), Westbury HS and Rice University.

Three designs were submitted and voted on at a WAIC meeting and a Westbury Civic Club meeting. The design chose was by artist Carolina Gonzalez; www.Carolinasart.com entitled "ISS over Texas."



When Crime Happens-Working Together

A Westbury resident in Parkwest 3 on Braewick reached out to the WCC office after they, along with several of their surrounding neighbors had been the target of several break ins. Their sheds and garages were pilfered through and items stolen. The resident had video of the culprit(s). Some properties were hit or visited multiple times.

Westbury Area Patrol Sergeant Derkowski with Harris County Constable Precinct 5 and his deputies worked countless hours to identify and apprehend these criminals. They visited the nearby apartment complex armed with the photo and identified one of the suspects. The WCC reached out to the residents and invited them to attend the Brays Oak Management Public Safety meeting. Becky Edmondson made public comment about crime on Braewick as well as at the Heights of Post Oak apartments and the Friendly Food mart. The resident spoke at the meeting as well and the Gessner HPD DRT officers responded in a big

way. They have a special ATV unit that they used to patrol the Braewick ditch. Eventually there was an arrest and the culprit taken to jail. This was a cooperative effort of Pct 5 and the HPD Gessner station. An email was sent to thank Pct 5 for their work on this case.



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Helpful Weather Sources

Does rain make you nervous? Are you unsure on the weather forecasts? Does listening to the news weather reports make you panic? You are not alone. Houston weather over the past couple years has made us all very wary, if not scared, of storms.



Houston gets rain. The trick is to know where and how much. There are many good websites and apps available that can help guide you before rain events or during them. One good piece of advice is to look for warnings and alerts from the actual source, for example the National Hurricane Center. This is not a complete list but just one meant to help guide you and add to your storm preparations.

Harris County Flood Warning System www.harriscountyfws.org

This website is extremely helpful <u>during</u> a rain event. It shows real time bayou levels and rainfall amounts at gages that have been installed along the bayous. **Gage 445** is located in Westbury on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at the Landsdowne bridge. Gage 440 is located on Brays Bayou at S. Rice. A new tool just introduced is the ability to sign up for Flood Alerts by gage. Another tool available on the website is a Flood Inundation real time map that can help residents make critical decisions regarding life and property during events. If you are ever curious about the rainfall amounts and rate, you can also look up historical data.

National Hurricane Center www.nhc.noaa.gov

If there is a chance of a named storm or there is a current named storm, the National Hurricane Center is your go-to source. During an active named storm, there will be multiple updates issued along with many different maps. These include the wind probability, the storm track cone, storm surge, tides, and many more.

Hype-free Weather Forecast www.spacecityweather.com

This website is dedicated to covering Houston weather news and forecasting with accuracy and without hype. Space City Weather was founded in October 2015. This website isn't about making money or getting "hits", it is truly about providing residents and business owners a quality forecast to make informed decisions. Eric Berger and Matt Lanza provide the best forecast for Houston weather. You can also follow them on Facebook.

Sign Up for Power Outage Alerts

A helpful alert service about Centerpoint power outages is Power Alert Service (PAS) which can notify you, friends and family of a power outage, its restoration progress, and when the electricity comes back on.

Thanks to upgrades, you can send alerts to up to five texts, five emails and five phone numbers.

Sign up for Flood Gage Warning Alerts

The regional Flood Warning System measures rainfall and monitors water levels in bayous, creeks, and rivers on a real-time basis to inform area residents of potential flooding conditions. This system relies on a network of 250 gage stations that have been strategically placed throughout Harris and surrounding counties. Westbury has one of these gages located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou (#445). This information is available at

www.harriscountyfws.org

You can now sign up for alerts on a specific gages near your home or work. You can receive default rainfall and water level alerts or create custom water alerts.

The Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne rises quickly and it's imperative for surrounding homeowners to know what is happening. It is important to remember that this gage will likely stay at a certain level (approximately 51-52ft) when flood waters are going over the weirs downstream at the Willow Waterhole detention basins.

Westbury Flood Gage Explained

Westbury has a flood gage located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne (gage 445). The gage can be accessed here, https://www.harriscountyfws.org/GageDetail/ Index/445.

Once the Willow Waterhole Bayou reaches a certain level, the water will overflow the weirs into the basins at the Willow Waterhole complex. The Westbury flood gage (which is upstream of the basins) will read steady at this point, typically around 51.2-51.5ft. It is also at this same level, that the flood control system will show that flooding is possible in Westbury and the news will start reporting it as such. While this is technically true and flooding can happen anywhere, it is important to remember that we have the basins downstream. Watch the gage levels to really know. If the gage holds steady, it is likely water is flowing into the basins not homes. If the gage were to start rising again, flooding would be very likely in Westbury homes. The unknown factor is how full the basins are or will get once it starts raining. There is no gage or camera at the basins.

The gage in Westbury is set to only update when there is a change in water level. If we are in the middle of a rain event and the gage stops updating, while at a level of 51.2-51.5ft, it is likely the water is overflowing the weirs downstream.

Sign Up for Alerts from The City



Sometimes it is easy to become complacent with weather alerts, but emails, texts, and phone calls sent from the City Alert System can be extremely helpful. Sign up for City Alerts thru AlertHouston. Timely information during emergencies is important. AlertHouston delivers critical information to Houston residents regarding current conditions, expected impacts, and protective actions to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

These alerts are issued by City of Houston Office of Emergency Management (OEM). Messages are issued for citywide and neighborhood level emergencies.

Hurricane Preparation Tips

The reality of living so close to the coast is that hurricanes can effect us, knowing what to do and having a plan is extremely helpful. There is a chance every year that our storm will come, we just hope not. If a major hurricane is predicted to hit Houston, you need to prepare for the wind and rain during the storm itself and for the aftermath of no power for 2-3 weeks.

Should I stay or should I go now? The first decision ultimately is when to stay and at what point, if ever, do you leave. A longtime hurricane saying is "run from the surge, hide from the wind". If you are medically dependent on electricity and do not have a generator, you need to have a plan for a place to stay during and after the storm. Most residents can stay in their Westbury homes during a major hurricane. You hunker down and prepare for the wind (discussed to the right). Houston residents do not need to be on the roadways as those will be needed for coastal evacuations. The next question is: do you stay in your home with no power after the storm, or do you leave town at that point? This decision will help with how you plan for buying food, water, gas, charcoal, etc. Some needs are for the storm itself and others are for the aftermath of no electricity for weeks.

The two lists on this page were created by Westbury residents and are meant to be a helpful guide. There are official hurricane prep lists available on all the major news channels websites, which are also helpful tools to help plan. Be prepared and be safe.



Long-term Hurricane Preparation Tips

- → Keep your trees trimmed. Wind is the biggest threat to Westbury in a major hurricane. Keeping your branches off your home, garage, fences, and power line is important.
- → Buy a portable gas generator. It is easy to get a generator when there isn't a storm aimed straight at us. They quickly become hot items. Plan ahead.
- → Measure your windows and have plywood stored in the garage to place over your windows when needed. Some new windows are hurricane strength but the original Westbury home windows are not.
- → Make a hurricane prep box containing flashlights, batteries, battery operated radio, candle, lighters, matches, etc., so it's already on hand.
- → Save a stash of empty water bottles to fill up for your freezer to make ice or cold water.
- → Copy important documents, place in sealable plastic bag, ready to take with you quickly.




Immediate Hurricane Preparation Tips

(This would ideally be done over several days leading up to landfall).
☐ Fill all vehicles with gas.
$\hfill \Box$ Buy gas for your generator if you have one. Fill up any extra tanks.
☐ Get extra cash.
☐ Make sure to have at least 2 weeks worth of all medicines. Get prescriptions filled if needed.
☐ Secure all items outside that can blow in the wind. Move patio furniture inside garage. Move potted plants to secure location. Secure or place your grills inside.
☐ Don't forget the kids items. Take off swings from swing set. Flip, disassemble, secure trampolines as they can fly. Lay basketball goals down on sides. Move all toys and bikes inside.
$\hfill \square$ Move your trash cans to your garage or secure them very well to a tree or post. Duct tape the lids shut.
☐ For major storms, put plywood over your windows. It is not recommended to tape your windows, as this can cause more dangerous shards of glass than if it were to break naturally.
$\hfill \Box$ Freeze bottles of water to make ice that will extend life of your freezer or refrigerator. Make as many as possible as they can be used in an ice chest as well.
☐ Have flashlights and batteries. Buy extra batteries if needed. Having a battery operated lantern for main room or head flashlights for each person are handy. Kids might enjoy glow sticks.
☐ Have candles or oil lamps ready
☐ Get matches or lighters for candles, grill, or your gas stove.
☐ Have a battery operated radio so you can listen to alerts. Some new models have charging ports and special NOAA channel.
☐ Buy at least one week's worth of non-perishable foods. Suggested items include peanut butter crackers, bread, muffins, fruit with longer shelf life such as apples and oranges, snack bars, granola, beef jerky, trail mixes, applesauce, fruit cups and canned goods.
☐ Ensure you have enough pet food and supplies such as kitty litter for at least 2 weeks.
$\hfill \square$ Buy charcoal or propane for your grill so you can cook outside if power goes out.
☐ Get extra water. (And wine!)
☐ Charge all devices and keep fully charged until power goes out. You can sit in your car later for some AC and charge your phone.
$\hfill \Box$ Do all laundry. Wash sheets. Start with clean slate to minimize problems with heat and sweat.
☐ Wash all dishes.
☐ Fill bathtub or large buckets with water. If there is no City water available, you can use the stored water in your toilet to flush.
☐ Have a secure place in your house already planned and ready with a blanket and pillow and radio/phone. Ideally away from any windows. In many Westbury homes, that is likely your hallway, even if it has no doors, you can shut the individual bedroom doors that have windows so hallway is more secure.

☐ If you have kids, have them help with preparations and explain why you are preparing. It helps with anxiety to have a plan and be a

part of it. Have them grab a book and a lovey if they have one.

☐ Clean storm drains and gutters in front of your home.







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
